
### The Boy Who Cried "Wolf"

It was a lonely spot at the edge of a dark forest, and there were no companions with whom to pass the wary hours of the day.

One day, just to stir up some excitement, he rushed down from the pastures, crying, "Wolf, wolf." The villagers heard the alarm and came running with clubs to help chase the enemy away, only to find the sheep grazing peacefully and no wolf in sight.



So well had the trick worked that the foolish boy tried it again and again, and each time the villagers came running, only to be laughed at for their troubles.

But there came a day when the wolf really came. The boy screamed and cried for help. But all in vain! The villagers, supposing him to be up to his old tricks, paid no attention to his cries, and the wolf devoured the sheep.
